Measure 15-232, Ashland

Measure 15-232 would allow City Council candidates to run for any of the three open

Council seats, instead of requiring them to run for designated seat positions 1 to 6. The

current rules, which require candidates to run for specific seats, make it so that

candidates can only run for election against other candidates who seek the same seat.

"The change will now allow candidates to run for any of the three open Council seats

that are open for election every four years," the voter's pamphlet said. "The candidates

who receive the three greatest number of votes will receive a full-term seat."

If there are more than three seats open, the remaining open seats will be filled by "vote

earners," the pamphlet said.

Measure 15-233, Ashland

Measure 15-233 would amend the Ashland city charter and make it so that the

Municipal Judge would be appointed by mayor and council. Currently, the Municipal

Judge is an elected position and is decided by the voters.

The mayor and council would appoint someone to be municipal judge by evaluating

their experience and skills, the pamphlet said. Currently, as an elected position, there

are no requirements for the municipal judge except for being admitted to the Oregon

State Bar.

Measure 15-234, Ashland

This measure would allow the City of Ashland to issue bonds that would fund

construct a new water treatment plant.

"[The measure] asks voters whether the City of Ashland should be authorized to issue water revenue bonds to finance the construction of a new water treatment plant and the rehabilitation of associated infrastructure in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed [\$75 million]," the pamphlet said. "Water revenue bonds are secured by and payable from revenues generated form the city's water system."

The measure is not about whether or not to fund the water treatment plant, the pamphlet said -- it is about securing bonds to fund the plant.

"Should the measure not pass, the city will need to explore alternative financing options such as general obligation bonds. General obligation bonds require voter approval and would authorize the city to increase property taxes to repay the general obligation bonds," the pamphlet said. "In contrast, water revenue bonds do not affect property taxes as they are repaid by revenues generated by the water system. Water rates will be increased as needed to ensure the water system and associated project debt are funded correctly."

Measure 15-235, Gold Hill

This measure would revise and update the Gold Hill City Charter. Most notable, it

would change the mayor's term from two years to four years.

"The proposed revisions would reorganize and streamline existing Charter provisions,

eliminate repetitive and outdated sections, update Charter language, and ensure

conformity with state law," the pamphlet said. "The revisions would clarify the City

Council's voting and quorum requirements, establish the position of City Manager as a

charter-level City officer, and formalize the City Council's legislative, administrative

and quasi-judicial authority."

The government would change from a mayor/council form to a council/manager form,

the pamphlet said. All elections for city offices would also become non-partisan. The

city recorder would go from being appointed by the council to being appointed by the

city manager.

Measure 15-230, Rogue River

This measure would repeal and replace term limits for Rogue River's mayor and city

councilors.

The voter's pamphlet says that currently, someone who serves two terms as councilor

or mayor can sit out one election cycle and then run again -- but no one can serve more

than 12 years. A term for both city council and mayor is four years.

"The effect of the proposed Charter amendment is to allow any elected official to serve

a total of 16 consecutive years regardless of whether those years are served as

Councilor or Mayor," the voter's pamphlet said. "Each term would remain at four (4)

years and elected officials would need to run for office every four (4) years. No elected official would be allowed to serve more than 16 consecutive years."

Measure 15-231, Rogue River

Measure 15-231 would prohibit psilocybin businesses within the City of Rogue River. While psilocybin is legal in Oregon, a city can "opt out" by creating an ordinance outlawing psilocybin businesses in city boundaries. If the measure is not passed, psilocybin businesses will be allowed in Rogue River.

Measure 17-119, Rogue Community College District

This measure would approve bonds to Rogue Community College that would go towards funding building improvements, workforce training programs, accessibility improvements and safety/security.

Bond levy rates would continue in Jackson and Josephine counties at \$0.13 per \$1,000 of assessed property value, the pamphlet said. The state will provide a matching \$15 million in funds.

"If this measure is approved, the College estimates that property owners in Jackson County would continue to pay the same rate for the College's bonds as they are currently paying," the pamphlet said.

Below is a list, straight from the voter's pamphlet, of proposed projects.

- Increasing capacity in workforce training programs to meet growing enrollment in programs and improve space utilization:
  - apprenticeship, diesel, commercial truck driving, pre-nursing, welding,
    manufacturing and adding automotive at Table Rock Campus (White City)
  - automotive, welding, manufacturing and adding EMT, diesel programs at Redwood Campus (Grants Pass)
- Enhancing safety with improved camera systems, and lockdown systems
- Updating aging building systems to extend lifespan and improve energy efficiency including roofs and HVAC
- Renovating downtown Medford campus with new student success center for more learning opportunities outside the classroom
- Makes upgrades to improve ADA accessibility -- also known as the Americans with Disabilities Act -- to improve student, staff, and community member access to College buildings.

Measure 17-123: Three Rivers School District

Measure 17-123 would authorize \$39 million in bonds to improve safety, security and re-roof old buildings. This would cost taxpayers \$0.42 per \$1,000 of property value. A resident who owns a property worth \$300,000 would pay \$126 per year.

The Three Rivers School District has been awarded a \$6 million grant which will only go through if they pass the bonds, the pamphlet said. The funds will allow them to reroof buildings and add safety measures such as extra fencing, manned gates, buzz-in entry systems, camera, key card entry, security lighting, security doors and hardware.
